

Trickle-Down **Effect**

Seventy-one percent of the Earth's surface is covered by water — no wonder that even in the midst of the desert we are drawn to it.

You can enliven your landscape with H2O in a variety of ways, including adding everything from koi ponds to reflecting pools to fountains.

Positioning the water feature is important, because not only does it have to fit, and complement your landscaping, you will want to take advantage of the soothing sounds it can produce.

If you have children, you may want to consider having a splash pad installed, which can provide entertainment for them without necessitating having the area fenced off.

And if you're a wildlife watcher, even a small bubbler pot fountain will attract hummingbirds and other colorful winged inhabitants.

A cantara mill stone flows water into an octagonal basin, providing a serene spot in an entry courtyard. Design by Realm. Photo courtesy of Realm.


2. Poured Over
